ABOUT	La Lumiere School is a private, independent boarding and day school founded in 1963 and located in La Porte, Indiana. The school is a member of the National Association of Independent Schools and The Association of Boarding Schools, and is accredited by the Independent Schools Association of the Central States.

## DISTINCTIONS AND SIGNATURE PROGRAMS

STUDENT LEADERSHIP PROGRAM	Students are able to hold formal office through the Prefect Leadership Program, which offers positions in student life, admissions, service, spiritual life, residential life, athletics, and global community. Prefects are vetted through a series of intensive peer and faculty interviews, and the Head Prefect is considered through interviews and a student body vote. The School also provides extensive support for students who want to serve the La Lumiere community through other means, including working side-by-side with students who are interested in developing special academic and co-curricular programming according to their talents and interests.
PORTFOLIO WRITING PROGRAM	The English departmet emphasizes students' growth as writers through a portfolio program. All freshmen take Introduction to Literature and Composition, all sophomores take Literature and Composition, and juniors and seniors take two semester-long seminars of their choice, one in writing and one in literature. As the culminating project in each of these courses, students select their best writing, make revisions, and submit it to their portfolio. To observe their own growth, underclassmen complete written portfolio reflections, while upperclassmen present their selection and process to their peers.
ETHICS	Ethics addresses the question: "What should I do?" The senior capstone course at La Lumiere, Ethics, challenges students to navigate questions of right and wrong, deeply-held values, and the Good Life in the context of a seminar-based class. Students read closely, annotate thoughtfully, listen actively, think critically, write incisively, synthesize disparate perspectives, and engage constructively with peers. Students examine the ideas of seminal philosophers, artists, and theologians, and apply their theories to ethical issues in contemporary society.
INTERNATIONAL STUDY AND SERVICE PROGRAMS	La Lumiere offers academic and service travel programs during school breaks to various locations around the globe. In the past, these trips have included the Czech Republic, England, Nicaragua, Spain, and Taiwan. Travel programs are designed to provide students with rich cultural and/or linguistic immersion experience. The School sponsors Spring trips to Costa Rica, Ireland, and France.
COMMUNITY SERVICE	La Lumiere believes that selfless giving and understanding the needs of one's broader community are integral parts of character formation. We aim to cultivate among our students a willingness and desire to serve, and encourage participation in community service.
CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES	La Lumiere student participate in three co-curricular activities per year. Of these activities, students are required to participate in at least one team activity and one athletic activity per year. Students may choose from a variety of sports teams or offerings in art, music, fitness, Vex Robotics, Academic Decathlon, and Academic Super Bowl.

# **COVID-19 Statement**

In fall 2020, La Lumiere returend to in-person classes from August 16 through November 20, with most classes taking place in outdoor classrooms. Following Thanksgiving break, classes resumed remotely through the end of the semester. Beginning in January 2021, classes resumed indoors and in-person. In fall 2021, co-curricular activities resumed in full.

# Standardized Tests

Seventy-two percent of the class of 2023 took a standardized test. Twenty-four students took the SAT, seventeen students took the ACT, and nine took both.


