

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A SEASON OF GROWTH

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO GROW?

Saws and hammers echo through the main quad as the sun gilds the yellow leaves during the "golden hour" one late afternoon in early November. The first rows of pine logs form an outline of the future chapel. In the Main Office next door, a rendering of the finished product leans up against the window, giving visitors and students alike a glimpse of what is to come.

"We took an all-hands-on-deck approach to this important project, with design input spanning from the class of 1968 all the way to current students and faculty," Brian Tonino, the interim Director of Development said. Indeed, five stain options for the exterior of the chapel are arrayed on the Main Office floor with space for folks to vote for their favorite option as they come to check for mail.

The last two years have brought a new phase of growth to the wooded acres of La Lumiere, and the changes are energizing to witness. Last year, the pandemic forced us outside in a way we've come to appreciate—while rented wedding tents enabled us to learn safely in person last fall, permanent pavilions and a revitalized amphitheatre promise that education will continue happening outside whenever possible for years to come. This is part of an increased emphasis on "place-based learning," and on a campus like ours, the value of such efforts is clear.

A PROPER WELCOME

The school hasn't always owned the property on the corner of 650 and Wilhelm, and thanks to the magic of GPS in rural Indiana, first-time visitors can arrive confused. Part of making a good first impression is having a fitting sign to welcome one and all to our campus, and the Parents Association and the class of 1969 generously agreed to underwrite the cost of a monument-style sign at the top of the berm on the corner pond. Carved into Indiana limestone and set atop the same split-face granite featured on the chimney in Moore House, the new sign properly conveys the quality of what takes place on the campus behind it.

NURTURING THE LANDSCAPE

It might seem counterintuitive to start a landscaping project by cutting down a bunch of trees, but removing the white pines on the west end of the main parking lot was a critical first step to beautifying the "front door" of campus, and doing it in a sustainable, educational way.

Partnering with Land Resource Management Group, which provides environmentally focused planning and design, we rethought the space and created rain gardens with the help of some of our students. The new landscaping serves the school in multiple ways—from mitigating water runoff to adding native plants to the quad, this initiative was about more than looking pretty.

This mindset is essential for understanding the ethical and academic importance that this change is bringing about. Being able to identify stewardship opportunities for our school community, we see these as character-building endeavors, similar to what took place last year with the reshaping of Judy's Cresslet Rivulet near Lake La Lumiere, where student-driven efforts reclaimed the small stream and amplified the natural beauty of the campus. Like the rivulet, this new garden will also require commitment and stewardship from our student body and the entire school community for it to thrive.





"The rain garden is just the latest exciting project in La Lu's continued commitment to improve our environmental footprint. PROVIDING A FORUM, HONORING A LEGACY

Along the shore of Lake La Lumiere, a new feature will take shape in 2022. The Forum, which was announced and partially funded during La Lumiere's Alumni and Parents Weekend early in the fall, will be a new venue for students and faculty to gather in what is essentially the best waterfront real estate on campus. Like in ancient Rome, The Forum will be a public space that can host multiple community activities. It will serve as an outdoor classroom, a location for advisories to meet, a venue for Fine Arts Fridays, and just a place to relax during an in-between moment. The Forum, which is a tribute to Bryan and Judy Smith, will be a long-lasting symbol of their steadfast devotion to the students of La Lumiere. "We chose this project, believing that it would be a wonderful gathering place for faculty, students, and staff for years to come. And both would definitely bring out the full potential of the natural beauty in the area along Lake La Lumiere," Bryan and Judy Smith said.



REPLACING THE ORIGINAL CHAPEL

By mid-November, the chapel has begun to take shape. Sun filters through the trees and illuminates the structure. The new chapel is in the same location as the former chapel, which was removed due to moisture causing irreparable damage. The sounds of construction continue, but there is no longer a need to reference a rendering to understand what the building will look like in its final form.

"La Lumiere is dedicated to the pursuit of wisdom and knowledge, and therefore it is incumbent upon the school to provide both worship spaces and classrooms. It is our school's mission to produce not only skilled citizens for the world but also wise citizens for heaven," Sacristan Prefect Isaac Fielder said. "I was really enthusiastic because this was an outward expression of our school's concern for our students' character as well as their scholarship."

At La Lumiere, faith is an integral part of our student's education. The opportunity to pursue spiritual understanding as a community is key. Oftentimes this pursuit takes place within the natural world through an appreciation of the beauty of the environment. Now, with the construction of the new chapel, there is room for this exploration to move into a sacred and spiritual space where students and our greater community will be able to find solace and silence for reflection and prayer. This inner work is essential for solidifying values and how we act within the wider world.

"An active and authentic spiritual life centered on reflection, self-awareness, and hope has always been and will continue to be part of the DNA of La Lumiere," said Adam Kronk, head of school. "The Catholic tradition and its vision of the dignity of the human person informs what we value and how we act. The rebuilt chapel will provide a literal and symbolic home for the important work of finding the divine in and around us; honoring every individual we encounter as a miraculous, loved being."

PICKING UP STEAM

For the last two years, La Lumiere has grown through uncertain times and emerged stronger than before the onset of the global pandemic. Throughout this period our community has found its strength, reflected on what can be improved, and started the process of growth for the future.

"Each of the recent improvements to campus is exciting in its own right," reflects Kronk, "but in my mind, we are just getting warmed up. This school has incredible potential and having the facilities and environment to match the exceptional programming that takes place here is an obvious next step. I hope these projects continue to build a sense of pride in place—they are a prelude of what's in store in the very near future." **L**

Small Business Owner Transforms Business for the Better Amidst Pandemic

A rock climber. A veteran. A certified personal trainer. And now, a builder. Mac McDonald really has done it all. As the owner of the local "Body Evolution" gym, Mac, a Scottsman who moved to South Bend about twenty years ago, faced difficulties last March when the Covid-19 pandemic hit. Mac spent the first two months of quarantine training clients over Zoom or FaceTime, but soon came to realize how difficult it was. Most of his clients didn't have the sufficient equipment to train from home and it was difficult to establish relationships with new clients over a screen. When Mac received his PPP (Paycheck Protection Program) loan in May of 2020, he decided to put money towards creating an outdoor gym in the side yard of his South Bend home.

Mac had little building experience; he built the basement of his gym downtown, but had never made any kind of structure like this before. Using a plethora of YouTube videos and advice from well-versed friends, he was able to teach himself how to construct a usable gym space. "I was not really sure what the finished product was going to look like, as I built each section I then looked at the next part and tried to understand the requirements of my clients and thus what I was going to need to do" Mac says. He fulfilled his clients needs rather quickly. The floor and the ceiling of the space was completed in a matter of days, and add-ons like curtains and a walkway were added during the summer months.

When the winter months arrived and it became too cold to be fully outside, Mac converted his garage into another gym space. He bought heaters in order to keep the space warm and would keep the garage door open to allow for ventilation. Clients were able to work out mask-optional while distanced from their trainer and in an open space. In 11 months of operation, there have been no COVID-19 transmissions or cases associated with Mac's gym.



"I learned when I was here that we can change each other by the way we treat each other, and I learned this because La Lumiere changed me." This lesson and others have guided him throughout his life. During the Commencement Address, Mr. Rosshirt reflected on a Commencement ceremony 45 years ago. The address was given by Mr. Bill Linnen, who focused on how we, as a nation, could do better. This idea stuck with Mr. Rosshirt. "What I know now in a deeper way than I knew it before—is how profoundly, incomparably, absolutely, infinitely, indescribably, unquantifiably, important it is-how we treat each other," Mr. Rosshirt said.

This is the core principle that Mr. Rosshirt believes is able to unite our society. In a period of divisiveness, he sees a way forward: view every human being with the inherent worth they are born with. "When we cross divides and treat others with dignity, we're uniters. When we stick to our group and treat outsiders with contempt, we're dividers." Seeing the dignity in one another is where we begin, but it has long reaching impacts for ourselves and our nation: "today I'm trying to be a uniter—because, in my view, our country's future doesn't depend on whether liberals or conservatives prevail. It depends on whether uniters or dividers prevail."

La Lumiere's Head of School Adam Kronk closed out the ceremony by reminding the Class of 2021 and all attendees what lies ahead: "The world out there is going to be what you make of it. I am teeming with pride to send you out into it. If you bring the same sense of ownership and buy-in that you've displayed during your time here; everything will be just fine. Seek the light in those around you, be that light for others. Your La Lumiere family will be here cheering you on every step of the way. Class of 2021, represent us well."

AN EXCERPT FROM TOM ROSSHIRT'S 2021 COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS

What I know now in a deeper way than I knew it before—is how profoundly, incomparably, absolutely, infinitely, indescribably, unquantifiably important it is—how we treat each other.

To my mind, all the inventing and discovering and experimenting and exploring we've done in the history of human beings has never been able to uncover one thing that is more important—or more a mark of human progress—than how we treat each other.

How are we doing with that right now? Here at La Lumiere, we're doing well. In our country and our world, *not* so well. This is why I want to talk to you about the importance of how we treat each other—so I can urge you, when you leave here today, to respect the power of what you already know, and take the best of La Lumiere for the rest of your life.

So, let's imagine a single line that maps out—from worst to best—how we treat each other. On the worst end of the spectrum—is "contempt." Contempt is the key ingredient of every bad thing we do to each other.

I would like to say that what I know about contempt, I've learned from watching others. But I have to confess that I know what contempt feels like from the inside.

If I'm feeling contempt for a person or a group—I sneer, I get sarcastic, I roll my eyes. I blame them, I shame them, I exclude them, I won't listen to them, I won't look at them, and I won't go near them.

When I am speaking with contempt, I tell a lot of stories, but there is only one moral to the stories I tell: "We're the good people; they're the bad people. There's something wrong with them. They hate our values. They're trying to hurt us. They ruin everything. It's all their fault. *If only they weren't here*."

And I have found that when I'm speaking with contempt, I am never telling the whole truth—first because my contempt makes me desperate for others to share my contempt, so I invent and distort and exaggerate the flaws in others. And second, when I'm inflating their flaws, I can't see my own. So, I am blind to what I contribute to the problem, blind to my duty to offer a solution, and blind to my obligation become a better human being.

Arthur Brooks—the conservative author and Harvard professor—says contempt is our national problem. In his book *Love Your Enemies*, he writes "we have a cultural addiction to contempt—an addiction abetted by the outrage industrial complex ... and it's tearing us apart."

As long as contempt is an effective way to make money, become famous, or gain power, people will keep using it and things will keep getting worse. If we want to make our world better, we have to see that contempt is poison, and find a way to make it backfire.

How can we do that? Here's a start: Way over on this other side of the spectrum from contempt—is dignity. Dr. Donna Hicks is a conflict resolution specialist at Harvard who's spent more than 30 years working with people torn apart by war. Her research shows that dignity transcends race, gender, ethnicity and all other social distinctions.

She says "Our longing for *dignity* is the single most powerful force motivating our behavior. If you violate a group's dignity repeatedly, you will get war or terrorism or a revolution because a desire for revenge is an instant response to a dignity violation."

On the other hand, Dr. Hicks found that if indignity tears us apart, dignity—offering care and attention, listening to each other, acknowledging one another's presence, and especially our hardships—can put us back together again. **I**

DICK WEBSTER

Dick Webster served as Headmaster at La Lumiere from 1979 to 1984. Headmaster Webster, who was the second headmaster at La Lumiere, was instrumental in establishing the foundational tenets upon which our School continues to cultivate today. His legacy will live on through his four children and the hundreds of students that he mentored during his life, including many La Lumiere alumni who have cherished memories of both Headmaster Webster and his wife Betty, who preceded him in death.

Dick was a loving husband, father, and grandfather. Before the loss of Betty, they were married for 57 years and together they demonstrated the meaning of lifelong devotion to their family.

Headmaster Webster also devoted his life to the education of young people and the development of their character, in the classroom and on playing fields, courts, and mats across the country. A proud graduate of The Johns Hopkins University, where he served as captain of the varsity lacrosse team, he began his career as a teacher and coach and never stopped doing either. He worked with and for young men and women at the Severn School, Sewickley Academy, the Wroxeter School, Landon School, La Lumiere School, Montclair-Kimberly Academy, and The Boys' Latin School.

The number of lives he helped shape by the example he set and the guidance he gave cannot be counted. Above all, he showed everyone that a life worth living was one in which the word "Love" was spoken out loud and often.

Dick is survived by his sister, Mary Webster Wiglesworth; his four children Richard E. Webster Jr., Michael H. Webster, David W. Webster, and daughter Elizabeth Webster Twomey; and ten grandchildren Patrick, Grace, Jack, Luke, Harrison, Maisy, Christian, Michael, Maeve, and Lily.



MARY LOU LINNEN

Mary Lou Linnen, the first female member and Chair of the Board of Trustees of La Lumiere School, passed away just before sunset at home on Christmas Day. Mary Lou was the matriarch of La Lumiere in many ways. Over the weekend of her passing, Bryan Smith put it quite simply, but accurately, "La Lumiere would not exist if not for Mary Lou. The classiest person I've ever known."

Mary Lou was born and raised in Akron, Ohio, the only child of Dorothy and Frank Schellin. She was proud of being adopted and told her grandchildren that "unlike most, she was chosen by her parents." She attended the University of Akron while living at home, and was the president of her sorority, Delta Gamma. During college, she met Bill Linnen and they were married in 1954 after she graduated. They had five children and balanced one another perfectly (she was the organized one; he was the life of the party) as they raised a fun-filled, close-knit family. Bill's job took the family from Akron to Oak Lawn, IL, to Livonia and then Bloomfield Hills, MI, before they settled for good in Long Beach, IN, in 1966.

She was an astute entrepreneur, serving as the only female on the board of her husband's company, Tyler Refrigeration, after his death. Later, she helped found the Lighthouse Place Premium Outlets in Michigan City with over 120 stores to attract visitors to the area.
